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MMTA President's Letter

In Jeremy Denk's memoir *Every Good Boy Does Fine*, he details his musical journey, moment by moment, in captivating and powerful prose. But the most striking image is in the "Prelude" when he first hears a recording of Mozart's Sinfonia Concertante. His description is picturesque and lush, vivid and evocative. An amazing reminder that music can touch lives in so many ways! (Read the book, it's fabulous!)



Some of my favorite musical moments happen while I am teaching. We've all had those wonderful, funny, touching, embarrassing and ridiculous moments.

- When the student plays so beautifully, you're brought to tears (happened to me!).
- When there's a lightbulb moment and the student suddenly shapes phrases with crescendo and decrescendo, (and a parent gasps in the background!)
- When the student is embarrassed for a natural bodily function and you have to explain that it happens to all of us.
- When the student insists they need to know exactly how old you are...because by your wrinkles (or lack thereof) you must be older/younger than mom/dad/grandpa/ grandma/etc.
- When asked about the 1st and 5th degrees of the scale, the student says they're the tonic and Dominic.
- When asked for the F Major key signature, student replies "F# and C#". "What?"
 I say, raising an eyebrow. "Oh right," she says, "I was thinking of F Minor".
- And when the student gives you a hug after their lesson.

These are just some of the most poignant moments that come to my mind. And I am truly blessed to have an entire family that is heavily involved in music.

One of my favorite personal moments is knowing that I chose to learn the Schubert Piano Sonata in A Major Opus Posth. 120 (3rd mvt) just because my mother was studying the entire sonata when I was a young child. I would go to sleep listening to her practice, and that music is ingrained in my heart and soul. And what joy to be able to play it myself!

And the days long past when my grandfather would come into our house, sneak to the piano and announce his entry with the first lines of the Schumann Romanze Op 28 #2. We always knew it was him! (Unless of course he opted for his college fight song.)

May your new year be filled with incredible musical moments: with your students, with your family and friends and in your hearts. Happy New Year!

Many pieces, especially in the **Junior A** category, have very reputable and popular editions with different notation than the suggested edition on the 2023 list. It is acceptable to use a different edition; but please compare it CAREFULLY to the edition on the 2023 list. Using different notation may cause student disqualification which is never desirable.

• **NEW:** Encore edition preferred. **Take Repeat** and *da capo*. (When playing the da capo, *omit the 1st ending*.) Do not use an edition that contains double 3rds starting in m. 82.

MMTA Piano Young Artist

Do you have student who was declared a winner in the MMTA Piano Contest in the Senior B level who isn't quite ready for the repertoire on the Senior Young Artist recommended list? Actually, requirements for Junior & Senior Young Artist recently changed. Repertoire lists are now recommendations only and there is no longer a repertoire approval process. Choose repertoire demonstrating the student's musical ability, versatility, and technical facility.

Unchanged are time and theory requirements. Junior Young Artist (JYA) students are expected to perform a solo program for 7 minutes, representing at least two different time periods. Senior Young Artist (SYA) students are expected to perform a solo program for 15 minutes, representing at least two different time periods. The time listed is a maximum that the judges are able to hear. (There are no disqualifications for not filling the entire time listed, but using the time wisely will be to the student's advantage—that is omitting repeats.)

Theory requirements are still in effect: MMTA Theory Level 4 for JYA, MMTA Theory Level 5 for SYA, and college level theory for CYA.



Independent Music Teachers Forum - What I Learned from Water Aerobics Jenna Huntoon, Chair



I love water aerobics! I love it so much that despite teaching until 9:00 pm, I get up several days a week and get myself to the gym for a 7:00 am class. Even on cold, dark, winter mornings, I manage to leave the comfort of my warm bed, bundle up and drive to the gym. It's a great workout, and I love the camaraderie that has developed with all of my fellow waterbugs!

Recently one of our favorite teachers left her position and was replaced by a new teacher. We all loved "Ms. M" and were sad to see her go. Ms. M provided a great workout, pushing us to work just a little harder at each class, and was always encouraging. She was a workout instructor and motivational speaker in one. But life moves

forward, and we came to the pool excited for class with the new teacher. The new teacher, "Ms. J", did not seem to want to be there. She had no enthusiasm, didn't make eye contact with any of us, and didn't smile, she simply went through the motions of her job. The workouts became drudgery, and there were no positive feelings floating around this class. This caused quite a stir with us early pool workout lovers, with many of us quitting the class.

This really hit home for me in regards to teaching. Of course I know that having a good teacher makes an impact, but the huge difference in attitudes between the two was so startling, that it made me reflect on my own teaching. I aspire to always be the kind of teacher that motivates my students to work hard and come to lessons excited to share their love of music with me.

What is it like to teach the "littles"?

Sitting in front of a room full of babies, toddlers and preschoolers this week just brought a huge smile to my face. Every one of the babies, toddlers and preschoolers were in their own world. Babies were looking wide-eyed around them, one was looking for his mom. Another was finding a musical instrument to mouth. Toddlers were exploring so many different ways to try out instruments and moving their body in different ways, completely focused on having the color or the instrument they want. Preschoolers were trying to change the lyrics of the "Finger Family" rhyme to something about turkeys for the holiday. I loved it.

This is one of the beautiful challenges about teaching this age group - how do you reach these students where they are at? And that is one of the biggest challenges for every educator - how do you meet a student where they are at and guide them to become the best they can be?

This past week we were doing our major tonal patterns (i.e. do - mi - sol; sol - mi - do, etc.) and one of the toddlers who rarely speaks, took his turn and sang on pitch. The adults were surprised and quite impressed. You never know when a child will amaze you.

I'm always on the lookout for ways that I can reach students by finding the basic parts of music, so that all can participate where they're at and bring them to the next stage. One of my favorite activities is using a utility song to experiment with musical contrasts. For example, use the tune from the song, "Here We Go 'Round the Mulberry Bush," and use the phrase "This is the way we" change the verb to different actions (i.e. ... tap our sticks, tap so loud / quiet, walk / run around) The ideas are endless. The students will show you what they can do, what they're ready for, and what might be challenging now but you know will be easier in the future. Does that sound familiar with what you do with older students as well?

MMTA Student Composition Contest & Solo Festival

Greetings from Cheri Sykes, coordinator of the Student Original Composition Contest and Festival!

It's time to entice your students towards new avenues of musical creativity!

Composition is an expressive and exhilarating application of music study. It's where "the rubber meets the road" in music theory! All levels of students, Primary through Senior High, are eligible. Compositions may be for more than one instrumental medium, but not involve more than ten performers. The score must be on computer-generated notation software.

Winning composers will be invited to perform their piece at the MMTA State Convention in June 11-13, 2023.

Secondarily is the non-competitive "Festival" option, where pieces receive feedback, but are not scored or eligible for performance at the Convention. Submissions may be hand-written.

Voice & Instrumental Contests & Solo Festival

The registration deadline for Voice and Instrumental Young Artist Contest, Solo Contest and Solo Festival is January 15. The Contests and Solo Festival are in St. Cloud this year. Young Artist awards for each category in guitar, strings, clarinet, flute, organ & voice are as follows:

- Senior Young Artist 1st Place \$400
- Senior Young Artist 2nd Place \$300
- Senior Young Artist 3rd Place \$200
- Junior Young Artist 1st Place \$150
- Junior Young Artist 2nd Place \$100
- Junior Young Artist 3rd Place \$75
- College Young Artist 1st Place \$265

Voice teachers, please note that Young Artist expenses for competing singers are covered by the Shirley Holzer Endowment. These expenses include their registration fee and accompanist fee up to \$125

Judge Assignments for MMTA Events Jill Kilzer, NCTM, Judge Education Committee Chair

MMTA uses Endorsed Judges, trained by the Judge Education Committee (JEC), to give you and your students the beneficial experiences expected. MMTA's Endorsed Judges attend continuing education seminars every few years to stay up to date with judging procedures. Endorsed Judges are experienced teacher members who serve as knowledgeable and supportive judges for our events.

How are MMTA judges assigned?

- Endorsed Judges receive a judge signup webform link from the JEC for fall, winter and spring.
- 2. The judge uses the signup web form to indicate which events/dates/ locations they are available and interested in judging. A judge may indicate more than one event/location on the same date. Judges are asked to "save the date" on their own calendars.
- 3. The JEC and the Event Site Administrator work together selecting possible judges from among those completing the judge signup. An estimate for number of needed judges is made.
 - a. Preference is given to those judges who regularly attend judge education seminars.
 - b. JEC tries to provide judges from various parts of the state to events state wide.
 - c. Selection process distributes opportunity to all available qualified judges.
 - d. A few site administrators choose to procure judges several months in advance and prior to JEC seasonal signup via webform.
- 4. The JEC contacts possible judges to double check availability for assignment roughly 4-6 weeks before event date. Various circumstances may make the confirmation of availability contact earlier or later.
- 5. Contacted Endorsed Judges confirm their availability.
- 6. Endorsed Judges receive notice from the Event Site Administrator as to the assigned room/level and start and end times. A notice of assignment details will be sent roughly 2-4 weeks before an event. Those judges contacted by JEC/Event Site Administrators with specific date and details are "Assigned Judges".

What are "Stand-by Judges"?

Stand-by judges are selected and informed of their "stand-by" status 4-5 weeks prior to an event. Stand-by judges are asked to "save the date" for a specific event in case there is a need. Stand-by judges may become "Assigned Judges" if there are more registrations than anticipated of if there is a judge cancelation due to illness or emergency.
